



The Former Wixom Assembly Plant (and Future Renewable Energy Site)

Proud Past

- Ford Motor Company opened Lincoln Assembly Plant in 1957; renamed as Wixom Assembly Plant a year later
- The plant occupies 4.7 million square feet on 320-acre site, with 15 miles of assembly line
- As one of Ford's largest and oldest manufacturing sites, it produced 6.6 million vehicles during its 50 years of operation
- Over the years, Wixom produced the Lincoln Continental, Town Car, LS, Mark VI, VII and VIII, as well as the Ford Thunderbird and Ford GT
- Ford idled Wixom in 2007
- The site proved ideal for redevelopment for new manufacturing facilities with an existing, highly developed infrastructure including rail and power access

Bright Future



- Ford is selling its idled Wixom Assembly Plant to Xtreme Power of Austin, Texas, and Clairvoyant Energy of Santa Barbara, Calif., for redevelopment as a renewable energy park
- Ford worked with these companies and state, county and city officials to pave the way for the site's redevelopment
- Xtreme Power and Clairvoyant Energy will anchor the redeveloped site, occupying approximately half of the area, and will seek additional renewable energy manufacturing companies to expand the park
- The redevelopment represents an investment by Xtreme and Clairvoyant of \$725 million
- Production of energy storage and solar power systems to begin in 2011, creating more than 4,000 direct jobs
